

We solicit program submissions from a diverse group of presenters, regardless of their professional credentials. We believe that all fans can make thoughtful contributions to Jane Austen discourse. One aim of Virtual JaneCon is to promote the inclusion of presenters from all educational backgrounds. No Ph.D. required!

Our goal is to cultivate a radically inclusive discourse. Virtual JaneCon seeks to create an online environment in which contemporary readings, interpretations, and exploration is not silenced. We seek to uplift historically marginalized voices in the Austen community because we know that a greater variety of perspectives will lead to a richer understanding and appreciation of Jane Austen's works.

We celebrate Austen *and* Austen-adjacent interests. Passion for Austen expands far beyond the author and her works! Fans of Austen's works are also enthusiastic about costuming, history, books, film, and so much more. All of these things bring fresh appreciation of Austen and interest in her works. And we're here for all of it!

This event is free for participants and presenters. Virtual JaneCon will offer all events, presentations, and programming online free of charge to anyone who wants to attend. Anyone interested in presenting at Virtual JaneCon is welcome to submit a proposal free of charge.

At all stages of participation and submission, Virtual JaneCon is committed to accommodating the needs of attendees and presenters so that they may participate fully. Closed captioning, alt text, and verbal description of visual aids is a requirement.

The format we've adopted to present our programming attempts to eliminate barriers to access with free, on-demand, online content with a focus on maintaining safer spaces for attendees and presenters through moderation and community accountability. We strive to elevate the standards of online community building through continuous reflection. The values ascribed by Virtual JaneCon are not static and will change and evolve to best serve the event and surrounding community. Our community guidelines are developed out of this continual reflection. We require that all attendees, participants, and organizers adhere to these guidelines to keep this community safe and accountable.

Community Guidelines

In the interest of maintaining safer spaces we require adherence to the following guidelines developed out of Virtual JaneCon's principles of access and inclusion. All organizers, participants, and presenters will be expected to uphold these standards and work to educate themselves on why they are integral to this space.

Sessions, discussions, and any Virtual JaneCon social media interactions will be free of discriminatory or hateful language (explicit or implied) that targets people based on race, ethnicity, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, ability, religion, national origin, socio-economic class, education, or background.

Speakers and participants are expected to adopt contemporary language that addresses and acknowledges the racism and other forms of discrimination in historical terms. (See our FAQ for examples.)

In addition, Virtual JaneCon will not tolerate:

- Slurs and epithets
- Personal attacks or aggressive language
- Doxing or invasion of others' privacy

Virtual Jane Con encourages the use of content/trigger warnings in a visible place at the beginning of presentations and/or in the episode notes section where relevant.

Speakers and presenters are expected follow inclusivity best-practices by providing text descriptions of featured images and incorporating closed captioning in their presentations. Additionally, we will use alt text for images shared on social media platforms.

This is a space for expressing joy, admiration, and appreciation of all things Austen, and the ways the community celebrates her work and legacy. With the understanding that the values enumerated above are being adhered to, participants are expected to come to all events and discussions with an attitude of generosity and mutual respect.

JANE AUSTEN FAN FICTION: PAST, PRESENT, FUTURE

DESCRIPTION

Jane Austen Fan Fiction (JAFF) is one of the oldest organized fanfic fandoms and has a rich history and tradition. In this talk, we'll trace the history of JAFF from the early days of published Austen completions and sequels to the proliferation of online fanfic during the rise of the internet in the '90s, and then how it becomes part of the romance industry, especially once self-publishing becomes widely accessible. We will also explore how this fandom continues to evolve and thrive over nearly 200 years, and how JAFF performs important work in keeping Austen's work relevant to new generations of fans. Finally, by knowing where we've been, we know where we're going, so we'll also touch on some predictions for the future of JAFF.

BIOGRAPHY

Sarah Pesce (she/her) has been a Jane Austen fan since she was a teenager, which maybe not coincidentally was about the same time the 1995 *Pride & Prejudice* premiered. She can't remember if she read the book first or saw the miniseries first, but *Pride and Prejudice* (in all its many incarnations) has been her favourite since. She is a romance editor who specializes in contemporary romance, historical romance, and JAFF.

JANE AUSTEN AND THE BRITISH EAST INDIA COMPANY Presented by: Kelly Gardiner & Sharmini Kumar


DESCRIPTION

The British East India Company played a big role in Austen's world and in her fiction, even though it was never mentioned by name. We will discuss Jane's connection to this multinational corporation, and look at ways we see its influence in her writing.

BIOGRAPHY

Kelly Gardiner (she/they) writes historical fiction for all ages. Her latest series is The Firewatcher Chronicles. Her other books include Goddess, based on the life of Mademoiselle de Maupin; 1917: Australia's Great War, shortlisted for the NSW Premier's Young People's History Prize and Asher Award; the Swashbuckler pirate trilogy; and a picture book, Billabong Bill's Bushfire Christmas. Her young adult novels Act of Faith and The Sultan's Eyes were both shortlisted for the NSW Premier's Literary Awards, while Act of Faith was shortlisted for the ASA's Barbara Jefferis Award. A former journalist and editor, Kelly now teaches creative writing at La Trobe University.

Sharmini (she/her) has written, directed, and produced many performance pieces and short films, and is the founder and Artistic Director of 24 Carrot Productions. Sharmini loves Austen's humour and wit, and particularly likes to explore issues that are not often highlighted in adaptations of Austen's work.

DESCRIPTION

Drawing on sources such as David Nokes' Jane Austen: A Life, Samuel Richardson's Sir Charles Grandison, Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice, and Austen's own letters, my short presentation will discuss Jane Austen's extreme wariness and suspicion of matrimony, and the ways in which her most generally popular work, Pride and Prejudice, is an in-depth exploration of the pitfalls and possible benefits of marriage for women in her own time and social class.

DESCRIPTION

Since *Emma's* publication in 1815, it has been one of the most beloved books. With its wit and humor, one can see why *Emma* has stood the test of time. However, when it comes to adaptations of the book, one stands out. The 1995 teen film *Clueless* created a trend in adapting older works for the modern audience. It also created a life of its own as a cult classic. And why is that? We will be looking at why *Clueless* remains an iconic piece of cinematic history as well as why the book *Emma* is still being adapted to this day.

WOMEN'S VOICES AT THE TURN OF THE 19TH CENTURY: THE EXAMPLES OF *PRIDE AND PREJUDICE* (JANE AUSTEN) AND *THE MYSTERIES OF UDOLPHO* (ANN RADCLIFFE)

Presented by: Marie Sarraute-Armentia

DESCRIPTION

In this video, we'll explore the results of the comparative study Marie made for her master's dissertation in English. Topics will include how attentive Jane Austen was when it comes to characterization through speech styles; the battles over linguistic phenomena in 18th- and 19th-century magazines (including the apparently nonsensical use of langage by women); the differences in speech distribution between men and women in both novels; gendered expectations for women at the turn of the 19th century who were already perceived and depicted as speaking in a more "emotional" voice; and the fact that women are not only expected to speak less than men, but the phenomenon can be extended to a simpler and larger dynamic of power.

BIOGRAPHY

Marie Sarraute-Armentia (she/her) is a PhD student in sociolinguistics at the Université Bordeaux Montaigne in France.

DESCRIPTION


Last fall I began rereading Austen's books as well as her letters to her sister Cassandra to glean what plants and flowers she mentions. From there I poured over heirloom seed/plant catalogs to select similar varieties. Since January I have been in the process of transforming my Texas yard into an English country garden. I do the gardening dressed in a Regency era short gown, suspendered skirt, cap, and apron made specifically for the task. In the video I will talk about the process of sewing Regency era working clothes as well as the process to create the garden.

Eternal devotion was sealed with the watching of the 1995 BBC series of *Pride and Prejudice*. I will also discuss what followed Austen's unfinished novel (continuations, retellings, the Masterpiece *Sanditon*, etc.) to explain how we got to our current moment with this tale – specifically Miss Lambe – and why it all matters!

A fat costumer will discuss what current fat representation in period dramas set in the Regency period has meant to her (Penelope Featherington in *Bridgerton* and Arthur Parker in *Sanditon*) as well as the impact of past fat representation in Austen adaptations and other Regency period media (Joseph Sedley in *Vanity Fair*, Jack Aubrey in the *Master and Commander* series, other side characters in Austen adaptations) and how the lack of body diversity in period dramas has impacted her historical costuming aspirations. She will address her experience of inclusivity while purchasing historical costumes and patterns, attending sewing workshops, and participating in costumed events.

BIOGRAPHY

Lacy Phillips (she/her) is a writer and communications professional who has worked with over 40 non-profits helping them promote their brands and tell their stories. She hosts Ace Author Chat on Twitter every year on the first Sunday of Ace Week in October and is currently at work on a fantasy adventure novel. DESCRIPTION

When her sister Jane passed, Cassandra said, "She was the sun of my life, the gilder of every pleasure, the soother of every sorrow, I had not a thought concealed from her, and it is as if I had lost a part of myself." While Cassandra was grieving the loss of her best friend, what would she have worn and what traditions would she have observed in Regency England? Join Tiffany as she researches and creates a Regency mourning ensemble while discussing mourning traditions in Regency England.

BIOGRAPHY

Tiffany (she/her) is the owner/operator of Stitchin' Addiction, a small business that designs, makes, and sells women's 19th century clothing which is inspired by literary heroines. Using 30 years of sewing experience, meticulous attention to historical fashion construction and style, and her experience as an English teacher, each ensemble is the result of thorough research of a character's class, characterization of the heroine, and reference to period fashion plates and photos of extant dresses.

It is a truth universally acknowledged that Jane Austen's novels have inspired many literary adaptations—but what about pieces that aren't adaptations yet are still inspired by her, the ones that put Janeites at the center of the story? There's a surprisingly large amount of this "Austen-adjacent" literature, ranging from stories about saving Chawton House to romantic romps in England. In this program, we'll explore three Austen-adjacent works and reveal how the author herself still has a profound impact on readers over two hundred years later.

CONVERSATIONS WITH REGENCY PERIOD DRAMA FRIENDS: REFRAMING THE HISTORICAL ACCURACY DISCUSSION IN SUPPORT OF RACIAL DIVERSITY

Moderated by: Amanda-Rae Prescott

DESCRIPTION

Most Austen adaptations or Regency-set films and television shows are judged by how historically accurate the work appears to be, especially in regards to historical costuming and facts presented. As new Austen adaptations and Regency-set period dramas racially diversify their casts, use alternate historical interpretations and/or cover previously-ignored BIPOC history, the fandom has struggled with how to discuss these dramas in a way that doesn't alienate or gatekeep new fans or fans of color. This presentation is designed to explain why we need to reframe the conversation around *Bridgerton*, *Sanditon*, and future productions as well as demonstrating practical ways fans and content creators alike can create positive change through adapting antiracist and anti-gatekeeping language and discussion framing.

BIOGRAPHY

It has often been written that Jane Austen was an author ahead of her time, seemingly anticipating cultural shifts (like the feminist movement) and literary trends (like the marriage plot in the Victorian novel). Another way that Austen seems to have anticipated the future was in the way she plays with the construct of gender in her novels, particularly *Pride and Prejudice*. Using an often overlooked incident of cross-dressing in the novel, this video essay will explore how Austen pushes the boundaries of gender binaries and creates the foundation for the female gaze in literature and film.



Kerry Sinanan (she/her) is Assistant Professor in English at The University of Texas at San Antonio where she specializes in the Black Atlantic, race, and slavery in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. She can be found on Twitter at @kerry_sinanan

Tré Ventour-Griffiths (he/him) is an artist-academic and an advocate for multidisciplinary approaches to education and research. With interests in the Black histories of Britain that decentre urban-centric narratives that so dominate popular media, lots of his thinking also threads through various disciplines in the arts, humanities, and the social sciences - including history, sociology, film and television studies, and English literature. Tré is also a spoken word poet having read nationally and internationally, with much of his recent work revolving around autism and dyspraxia while Black. His research interests include but are not limited to Black West Indians in provincial Britain and race/whiteness in historical period dramas. With focuses on white supremacy and racism within society's institutions now and historically, he also works as an Associate Lecturer in Criminology at a university. Concurrently, he conducts educational sessions about neurodivergency, race, and Black history for public/private sector and community groups. His intrigue in present day inequalities stem from history, and how issues that are presented as 'new' or 'forgotten' have historical precedent. His recent "academic" work includes a paper with Leeds Beckett CRED that uses the story of Walter Tull as a vessel to explore the problematic nature of Black excellence narratives, where whiteness pervades ultimately reproducing hyper-capitalist takes of Black "success stories." Simultaneously, his ABO journal article on Austen allowed him to combine his passions for literature with media and sociology, looking at how colonialism's links to Regency houses should be vital in reading her work. Tré is published across different writing forms including poetry and journalism. Presently, he is working on a localised community history WATCH HERE project documenting the stories of Northamptonshire's Windrush Generation. A DEEP DIVE INTO MISS LAMBE: EXPLORING THE LIFE OF THE WEALTHY BLACK HEIRESS IN JANE AUSTEN'S SANDITON

Presented by: Tiffany Cruz

DESCRIPTION

Sanditon by Jane Austen, her final published work, showcases a new cast of characters and landscapes not seen in her previous publications. This unfinished book features Miss Lambe, a wealthy, Black heiress from the British West Indies who visits Sanditon on vacation. In my lecture, I analyze her character in the broader context of 19th century England. By exploring her character, one can learn more about race relations in England, Britain's West Indian colony, and the significance of her upper-class status in the novel. Due to the unfinished nature of the book, delving deeper into the historical context and looking at similar literature provides a more detailed character map of Miss Lambe that is missing from the original text, bringing her story to life. I also will examine the television show Sanditon to see how the program brings Miss Lambe's story to life, while exploring the parallels between the novel's adaptation and the historical context.

BIOGRAPHY

Tiffany Cruz (she/her) was born in New York City but has been living in the Bay Area for the past few years. She attends Mills College where she's working on getting her masters in English Literature. She focuses on 19th century British literature through the voices of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color. Tiffany believes in amplifying voices of those in the past and bringing them to life in the present. She also runs a bookstagram with over eight hundred followers, where she writes book reviews and shares recommendations.
